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A NOTE FROM THE CHAIR

Disadvantaged young people in Surrey deserve their opportunity to shine and have a real chance to fulfil their dreams. Here at the Surrey Young People's Fund (SYPF) we provide them with just that opportunity – to make the most of themselves and of what society can offer. As you will see later in this report, since we started our work at the end of 2014, we have dealt with almost 700 applicants for grants to help young people to improve their life prospects, and have awarded more than 460 grants, but there are many more who still require our assistance.

2020 presented young people in Surrey and across the country with unprecedented pressures and social challenges as a consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic. Financial hardship, school and college lives disrupted, significant increases in mental health and wellbeing issues, and social opportunities massively reduced have all led to increased pressures on all young people.

We are seeing more disadvantaged young people. Sometimes this is because of family circumstances; sometimes because of bullying at school or via social media; from mental health difficulties; or from disabilities. But what we also see is a spirit in these young people to overcome their issues. The SYPF team nurtures and grows this spirit and provides financial support and other guidance that makes a difference to their life opportunities. As a result, the young people benefit, and everyone involved in the programme should be immensely proud of their and our achievements.

Since the Fund's creation it has been a pleasure to work together with our talented team of panel members and CFS support staff. They have dedicated much time, effort and commitment to ensuring the best for the young people we assist. My thanks go to each and every one.

We also receive significant support from a range of Surrey agencies and organisations, without which we could not identify all the young people in need. Many of these also help us to assist the young people on their SYPF journeys, providing additional support in so many important and different ways. To each of these agencies and organisations I also add my thanks.

At the heart of our work are our Donors, without whom the Fund would not exist and the young people in Surrey could not benefit. A huge "THANK YOU" to them for their on-going support, belief in our goals and generosity, which is making such an impact to the young people we help.

To each reader of this report, I hope you will enjoy learning more from the following pages about the SYPF journey so far. To those of you already part of the team, I hope you will continue to lend us your support. And to those who are not yet engaged with our work, I hope you will consider supporting us too.

FUND OVERVIEW

The Surrey Young People's Fund (SYPF) was created at the end of 2014 when the Foundation brought together four initial donors to support disadvantaged young people in Surrey gain access to training and employment. Since start-up until the end of 2020 the Fund received donations totalling over £168,000 and supported 464 determined young people who wanted to improve their prospects, awarding a total of over £110,000.

We are delighted to work alongside and channel funds from the Surrey Supported Employment Fund for a second year running, to enable young people with a disability to move towards work and training.

In 2020, the average grant size was £259 showing that just a small amount can result in a life-changing opportunity.

Fund Priorities

SYPF supports individuals aged 16-25 at the time of application who are resident in Surrey and show the motivation to achieve their goals to gain access to training and employment.

Applicants tend to be in one of the following groups:

- People who are not in full time (16+ hours pw) employment
- People with disabilities or restricted by health conditions
- People with mental health conditions
- People in or leaving care
- Carers (including Surrey Young Carers)
- Offenders or ex-offenders
- People who are or have been in receipt of free school meals, and/or are in receipt of college bursaries.

Grants from SYPF are typically between £50 and £300 and can fund items directly related to enhancing the young person's employability skills, either through:

- Qualifications, certificates or licences
- Vocational or technical skills
- Self-development opportunities which improve social skills, motivation and confidence

Requests typically fall into one of the following categories:

- Course fees
- Travel costs (for education, training or employment)
- Childcare (for short term education or training)
- Equipment, materials or tools
- Work or training-related clothing
- Volunteering/work placement costs
- Online learning

FUND ACTIVITY

Donations Received

Six individual Donors, three companies and nine charitable trusts currently support the Fund, and we of course hope to see this donor family grow in the future.


Since establishment SYPF Donors have played a crucial role in supporting disadvantaged young people across Surrey, providing the Fund with a total of £168,013 in donations, for which we are most appreciative. In 2020, donations were received to the value of £38,850. It goes without saying the generosity of our Donors enables SYPF to continue to support more young people year on year.

Applicants the Fund has supported in 2020

Analysis of grant recipients during 2020 indicates the following spread of representation across our primary areas of focus; 50% of grantees identified a combination of these categories, demonstrating the depth of the needs we deal with.

- 79% of applications included the category 'Educational under-achievers'.
- 15% of applications included the category 'Unemployed (or working less than 16 hours per week)'.
- 16% of applications included the category 'Aged 16 -18 and not in full-time or part time school or college education or work-based learning, such as an apprenticeship'.
- 4% of grantees were offenders/ ex-offenders.
- 30% of grantees were in or leaving care.
- **11%** of grantees identified as having a **disability**.
- **10%** of grantees identified as having a **mental-health condition**.

Below is a pie chart displaying the age range of those applicants who were awarded grants in 2020. Accounting for 39% of successful grant applicants were those aged 16, the second largest age group were 17-year-olds at 32%. 14% of successful applicants were aged 20 or over.



Nature of Grants Awarded

The average size of grant provided was £259. The widespread nature of the support which this level of funding has provided for individuals across the county is outlined below.

Course fees

The Fund has supported young people to study various courses, including online training for a CSCS Card, and a Level 3 course in Health and Social care.

• Equipment, materials and tools

The largest proportion of grant awards were made under this category. Items which have been funded include laptops with Microsoft Office software, catering course equipment, photography equipment, and hairdressing equipment.

• Online learning

Grants generally supported online GCSE courses or L1/L2 vocational courses. For instance, one grant supported a young person who experienced severe bullying, to complete GCSE English and Maths via distance learning. Another young person with acute mental health challenges received funding to enable access to a Level 3 Counselling course, with hopes to go on to study Psychology and Counselling.

• Travel costs (for education, training or employment)


Travel costs can be supported where there is a barrier for a young person to access training, volunteering opportunities, work experience placements and employment.

One grant supported a young person who had not achieved the desired grades at GSCE and came from a substantially financially disadvantaged family to access a training course to study at a sports coaching academy.

• Work or training related clothing

These grants have included smart clothing such as shirts and ties for interviews and office-based or similar roles, as well as suitable work boots and safety clothing for the construction industry for example.

One grant enabled a young person from a significantly disadvantaged background to purchase suitable clothing for a training course in construction.




Breakdown of nature of support 2020


Geographic Spread of Grants Awarded

Individuals in each of the 11 Districts and Boroughs have been supported through SYPF. As shown on the graph below, the two areas in which the highest proportion of grant funding has been made to date are Spelthorne (20% of grants awarded) and Mole Valley (15% of grants awarded).

Waverley received the smallest amount this calendar year (2% of grants awarded), followed by Tandridge and Surrey Heath (each at 4%).



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In September and October, we saw an increase in applications, as young people began college courses and required kit and uniform to be able to take part in their chosen speciality.

totalled £21,592.78. In 2020 the grant application pattern during the year changed in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. An increased number of applications were received in April and May, mainly for laptops to enable young people to access online learning, as schools and colleges were closed. From June onwards, Government initiatives came into force

From the time of establishment to year end 2020, 440 grants have been awarded to over the value of just over £110,000. The maximum grant award was £676, and the minimum was £15.

The Fund has increased at a significant pace from its time of establishment. The total grant-making in Year One was $\pounds 2,356.86$, and this has grown through the generosity of our Donors to more than $\pounds 20,000$ each year since 2018; the grant-making in 2020

Referral organisations:


SYPF works with a wide range of referral organisations to support as many disadvantaged young people as possible.

Page 13 features a bar graph that provides a breakdown of the number of referrals each organisation has made in the calendar year 2020. Referrals made from Surrey County Council included those from SE Looked After Children's Team, Surrey Virtual School for Looked After Children and other teams like these.

U-Explore were the highest referrer outside of the County Council bodies and it is also interesting to note there were 12 parent/self-referrals.

A focus point for the Fund's work moving forward will be to maintain the strong relationship with Surrey Family Services and the County Council but also to increase our outreach to other organisations

END OF GRANT CASE STUDIES

Individuals who have received funding are asked to complete an end of grant report, designed to help evaluate the beneficial impact of the grant award.

This section of the report provides details of the end of grant reports which have been received and reviewed.

Names of individuals referred to in these case studies have been removed for the purposes of this report.

<u>SYP381</u>

Received funding so he could carry out and complete his CSCS card, which would enable him to enter building sites and access work. The funding allowed him to book his CSCS exam, which he passed with flying colours, a short time after he applied for and received his CSCS card. Within 2 weeks of receiving his CSCS card he had acquired a full-time position as a labourer working on a big contract at Gatwick Airport. He leaves for work every day at 0530 to get to his place of employment and works an 8-hour day 5 days per week. Now that he has a full-time job he has not been involved in anti-social behaviour or come to police attention. Without the financial support from SYPF he would not have been able to obtain work in this field, having no formal qualifications, which were proving to be an obstacle to further education or employment. This funding led to opportunities for hm, which has given him financial independence and a sense of selfworth.

<u>SYP491</u>

Had a challenging childhood, and was in care for many years, moving regularly between foster parents, with significant disruption to her schooling. She struggled with her mental health, and with conventional learning environments, but having experienced at first hand the care system she was drawn to the caring services. She applied for a grant to purchase a laptop to assist her with her job and training courses search. The laptop not only enabled her to search for work but also to undertake some rewarding side activities, and she worked alongside staff in the Council's UVP programme. This experience plus her abilities have led to her being offered an apprenticeship with the Civil Service.

<u>SYP496</u>

A young man who was unable to complete conventional schooling due to his complex conditions. Having undertaken supported learning at Brooklands he enrolled on a Level 1 catering course to pursue his passion for cooking, and needed catering uniform and equipment to undertake the course, but family circumstances made the purchase of these very difficult. SYPF were delighted to fund this grant, and he successfully completed his Level 1 course and has moved onto Level 2, keeping his dream of moving into a catering job very much alive.

<u>SYP524</u>

Is a young carer for her mother, and has had a number of mental health issues to deal with. As with many young carers, school was a struggle, however thanks to her efforts and some great support she managed to achieve several GCSEs. Her passion for the beauty sector led her to study for L1 and L2 Beauty in order to work towards her objective of running her own beauty business whilst continuing to care for her Mother. SYPF were able to help her by contributing to her course costs, and she is now well on the way to achieving her ambition.

I've completed all my theory for my beauty course and some of the practical work, however to finish the practical work I need models which is a lot harder at the moment! SYP538: I have been working but since coronavirus I stopped for a bit, but back to work next month so it has been good thanks – appreciate the help.

SYP590: Thank you and your helpful team very much for helping me to progress and do my work with this precious laptop. I really appreciate it. God bless you and your team.

SYP657: I'm doing good thanks. I'm planning on finding a full time job in a salon and then hopefully move on to starting up my own business sometime in the future.
